



CULTURE IN OUR CITY

Culture and creativity are part of everyone's daily life

Culture is the way we do things, how we express who we are. Whether reading a book or watching a film, sharing photos or attending a community festival, we participate in cultural and creative activities to understand our place in the world.

Culture in Blacktown is as diverse as our community. It is expressed through words, music, art, dance, performance, craft, fashion, food, festivals and celebrations.

Changing technology and our increasingly globalised world means that people are increasingly curating their own cultural experiences.

The range of choice we have is constantly expanding, and we are able to determine the terms of how, where and when we would like to participate.

Culture and creativity are crucial to the health, prosperity and vitality of our communities. They bring us together, help us enjoy our environment and flourish personally. They foster creativity and innovation, provide jobs and celebrate our unique heritage.

We live and work on the land of the Darug people, home to Australia's second largest urban Aboriginal population, and one of the most linguistically and culturally diverse cities in the country. A deep sense of culture, people and place sit at the heart of everything we do.



OUR CREATIVE CITY

Relevant to the whole of Council

Our Creative City is a living document and planning tool providing Council with a clear set of priorities for the enhancement of culture, arts and heritage facilities and initiatives across the City. This plan was developed based on research and engagement with the Blacktown community and the creative and cultural sector.

The overall purpose of the strategy is to guide Council's provision of dynamic cultural services and programs in the City and the social, cultural, environmental and economic outcomes that culture delivers.

It focuses on the big picture and the positive changes we can achieve in our community. It is designed to be relevant to the whole of Council. Our Blacktown 2036 is Council's Community Strategic Plan that articulates the vision of the community, and the kind of city that Blacktown wishes to be.

To ensure that Our Creative City plays a practical role in achieving Council's vision, the priorities for culture are divided among the six strategic directions outlined in Our Blacktown 2036:

- · a vibrant and inclusive community
- a clean, sustainable and healthy environment
- a smart and prosperous economy
- a growing city supported by accessible infrastructure
- · a sporting and active city
- · a leading city.

Our Creative City will focus on measurable outcomes for each of these strategic directions.

It offers the creative community a way of telling the story of the role it plays in inspiring creativity, building community resilience and encouraging health and well-being.





WHAT OUR COMMUNITY SAID HIGHLIGHTS

Several common themes emerged from community consultation:

Activity and Engagement

Strong interest in live performance, culturally-specific events and festivals, literature and film.

Access and Inclusion

Timing, affordability and location of events will help remove barriers to engagement, particularly for busy young families.

Information and awareness

A desire to know more about the range of activities taking place, promotion of Blacktown as a vibrant city with talented local creatives and artists.

Creative infrastructure

Support for maintaining and developing existing cultural facilities, and providing access to space for creative projects and development activities.

Spaces and places

Valuing the natural environment of Blacktown, enjoying the cultural activities and public art that activates nature reserves, parks and open public spaces.

Our community has told us they need:

- events that celebrate our city's cultural diversity
- a greater understanding of our First Nations stories
- higher quality rather than more events
- more programs for young people and families
- better communication and awareness of what's on
- affordable events and programs in accessible locations
- events and programs scheduled to suit working families.

We currently support a vibrant and inclusive community through:

- supporting the self-determination of First Nations Elders, community and artists
- a combination of major festivals and events, and local community festivals throughout the city
- The Leo Kelly Blacktown Arts Centre, with an arts and cultural program delivered throughout the city and online
- public art and events that activate and enhance our experience of streets and public spaces
- five libraries and a mobile library supporting access to literature, literacy and skills development
- The City Art Collection
- preserving historical records and heritage assets.

Our priorities

To offer a range of accessible arts and cultural facilities and activities throughout the city that enable our community to participate in a vibrant and inclusive cultural life, we will:

- increase representation and support for Darug and First Nations-led cultural programs
- ensure events and cultural programs reflect the diversity of the city's changing population
- integrate programming across Council's Library, Events and Arts and Cultural Development services
- have a coordinated approach to marketing cultural activities and events in the city

- target cultural activities and improve scheduling to meet the changing needs of our community
- support and showcase local artists and creative businesses
- formalise Council's approach to delivering public art and placebased experiences
- increase community access to historical records, heritage assets and Blacktown City's cultural collections.

CLEAN, SUSTAINABLE AND CLIMATE RESILIENT CITY STRATEGIC DIRECTION 2

Our community has told us they need:

- a greater understanding of First Nations connection to Country
- experiences that take place in and celebrate the natural environment
- to protect our built and natural heritage throughout Blacktown City
- public art that enhances our engagement with the built and natural environment
- to feel safe in all parts of the city.

We currently support a clean, sustainable and healthy environment through:

- public art and cultural activity in parks and open spaces that enhances the appreciation of our natural environment
- sustainable event management across all Blacktown cultural programs and events
- events and activities that have an environmental theme to encourage a deeper understanding of, and engagement with, environmental issues
- raising awareness of environmental issues through our cultural events and venues.



Our priorities

To prioritise activities that encourage critical reflection and deeper understanding of our natural and built environment, we will:

- champion projects that profile First Nations knowledge and leadership in connecting with Country
- preserve and promote the history and heritage of the St Bartholomew's Cemetery, activating the site to promote its heritage, stories and cultural value
- increase the delivery of public art that creates new ways to experience the environment, histories and cultural diversity of Blacktown City
- foster collaboration between artists and landscape designers that will improve our experience of public spaces, ensuring they are places of celebration, recreation and creativity

- include projects that educate and engage the community about environmental values and generate civic pride
- implement our sustainable procurement and sustainable event policies across all cultural events and activities.





A SMART AND PROSPEROUS ECONOMY

Cultural and creative activities are a major employer, support employment-enhancing skills and improve career opportunities, particularly for young people. Local events and activities attract visitors and support local businesses.

A SMART AND PROSPEROUS ECONOMY STRATEGIC DIRECTION 3

Our community has told us they need:

- creative workspace and business skill development opportunities
- greater representation in support programs for First Nations artists, culturally and linguistically diverse artists, and artists with disability
- access to means of production and cultural infrastructure
- support to overcome complex barriers in becoming professional artists
- opportunity to program and showcase work within the City's cultural programs and events.

We currently support a smart and prosperous economy through:

- major festivals and community events around Blacktown City, bringing people together and supporting local business
- supporting skills development and the sustainability of artists and creative businesses through a Creative Arts Fund and Arts Residency Program
- promoting local artists and organisations to support the local creative economy
- providing access to employment enhancing skills development
- acquiring the work of local artists and building Blacktown City's Cultural Collection
- supporting local sole traders, micro businesses and suppliers.

The cultural and creative industries contribute over **\$91 billion to the national economy,** around 5.2% of GDP, every year.

Arts and cultural activities enhance **education** and **employment** outcomes

Our priorities

To prioritise activities that support increased productivity, employment and economic well-being, we will:

- identify opportunities for local creative start-ups to deliver creative services and projects
- prioritise local suppliers for events and cultural programs delivered by Blacktown City
- increase opportunities for artists to generate income through the sale of their work
- identify under-utilised spaces that can be used to support local creative business to develop and grow sustainability

- increase the accessibility and awareness of existing grant and residency programs to underrepresented groups
- apply to COVID-19 stimulus programs for creative and cultural projects that employ local creatives.

In 2020 the impact of COVID-19 saw a loss of \$18 million to the local creative and recreation economy, with many creative practitioners not qualifying for wage subsidies and support

A GROWING CITY SUPPORTED BY ACCESSIBLE INFRASTRUCTURE

STRATEGIC DIRECTION 4

Our community has told us they need:

- upgraded facilities to accommodate a broader range and scale of activities in locations throughout Blacktown City
- more access to safe and affordable space to engage with and participate in cultural activities
- cultural and creative activities in locations close to public transport.

We currently support a growing city supported by accessible infrastructure through:

- five libraries and one mobile library in different locations across Blacktown City, accessed by over
 1.2 million people, per year
- The Leo Kelly Blacktown Arts
 Centre
- Main Street Artist Studios
- community centres in 45 locations across the city
- Blacktown Showground Precinct housing a range of cultural and community groups
- temporary and permanent public art in public spaces throughout Blacktown City.

Our priorities

To provide equitable access to community, arts and cultural facilities and open space, we will:

- review use of community facilities and identify opportunities to create greater access and affordability for cultural users throughout Blacktown City
- conduct a feasibility study for longterm storage and conservation of heritage items and the City Art Collection
- design and build a new outdoor stage at the Blacktown Showground Precinct
- refurbish the Main Street Artist Studios
- refurbish the Kelso Lane Creative
 Hub and make it accessible for
 cultural and creative use

- facilitate the use of public space, such as plazas, carparks and footpaths, for temporary cultural programs, events and artwork
- ensure environmental regeneration and new infrastructure makes Blacktown City's public spaces better suited to a changing climate and the delivery of seasonal cultural events.

The right provision of community resources will **foster diversity** of use, social inclusion and equitable access.

- opportunities to enjoy Blacktown City's parks, walking tracks and green spaces to improve health and well-being
- creative arts, craft, dance and socialising for their well-being
- an expanded range of opportunities for physical and recreational activity due to an increase in high-density housing and growing population
- equitable access to amenities, especially for young people in areas of high socio-economic disadvantage.

We currently support a sporting and active city through:

- cultural and creative programs that encourage participation
- festivals and events throughout the city, encouraging community leadership and participation
- enhancing public spaces, including parks and reserves, that create a welcoming environment for all forms of physical activity and recreation
- providing facilities for our community to meet and practice a broad range of cultural activity.

Our priorities

To prioritise cultural activities that encourage participation and social connectedness to contribute to health and well-being, form bonds between people who share common interests, and assist people to cope with life's events and challenges, we will:

- develop public art and activations of Blacktown City's parks and green spaces to encourage engagement and active lifestyles
- create participatory programs that engage people in a broad range of physical activity
- create new partnerships with a range of community service providers to design and deliver programs that combine cultural activities with health and wellbeing outcomes

- increase the provision of cultural and creative activities in locations throughout Blacktown City to combat the growing issues of loneliness and isolation
- implement responsive cultural programs to assist the community to recover from disasters and trauma
- use local artists in design of playgrounds and parks and areas of cultural significance
- gather together to celebrate community milestones and successes through events and community development programs.

- our organisational culture of teamwork, customer focus, innovation and safety
- building Blacktown's reputation and a sense of civic pride.
